#### Goals for the Day

### How is family engagement typically measured?

- Active participation in school sponsored activities (PTA, workshops)
- Visibly helping their children with school work or other school activities

#### Key elements

\* High level of commitment \* High level of active participation

### More effective starting point

- Establish a personal rapport between a school staff member and a family member
- Do not require high levels of commitment or active participation, at first
  - Offer low-risk, low-commitment activities to build relationships
  - Personalize communication with parents
  - Facilitate network-building between parents and family members
  - Building a parent community to enhance their social capital

#### Activities that build relationships

#### Tier 1: Low Risk

- Ice cream socials
- Movie nights
- Student art gallery
- Student performances
- Clothing or book swaps
- Newsletters home

#### Tier 2: Higher Participation

- Math, Science, or Reading Nights
- ESL or GED classes
- Parent Workshops
- File your taxes nights
- Hiring parent advocates
- Parent Leadership Trainings
- Building an "Activities Resume"

### Tax Refund to College Savings Plan

An example of a resource/ activity that will help build relationships with families while demonstrating your program's value.

## How does your School Define Family Engagement?

- Is it model of high commitment and high active participation?
- What is content of parent meetings?
- Are families involved in decision-making?
- Who is attending parent events, who creates the agenda?
- Who in the school has the best relationships with parents?
- What is the role of the classroom teacher?

# How does your Program Communicate Family Engagement?

- Branding
  - "That's the college person."
- Elevator Speech
  - Should lead to greater dialogue
  - Should answer who, what where, why?

# Multi-tiered model for family engagement

- Transform Involvement to Engagement
- Rethink Parent Conferences
- Redefine the Definition of Family
- Expand the School Walls
- Allow for other voices

### Tier III: What is a Parent Advocate? (Chicago GEAR UP)

- The parent advocate position is held by parents who can empathize with other parents, build trust with other parents, and as a result, strong relationships with other parents develop and serve to deliver the information necessary so all children can realize the dream of high school graduation and college. (Stack, 2010. Pg. 141).
- Parent advocates identify the needs/interests, recruit parents to participate, organize and facilitate programming, and lead presentations on parent involvement...The need to develop leadership opportunities within the stakeholders is essential to sustain the acquisition of social capital for the community. (Stack, 2010. Pg. 138)
